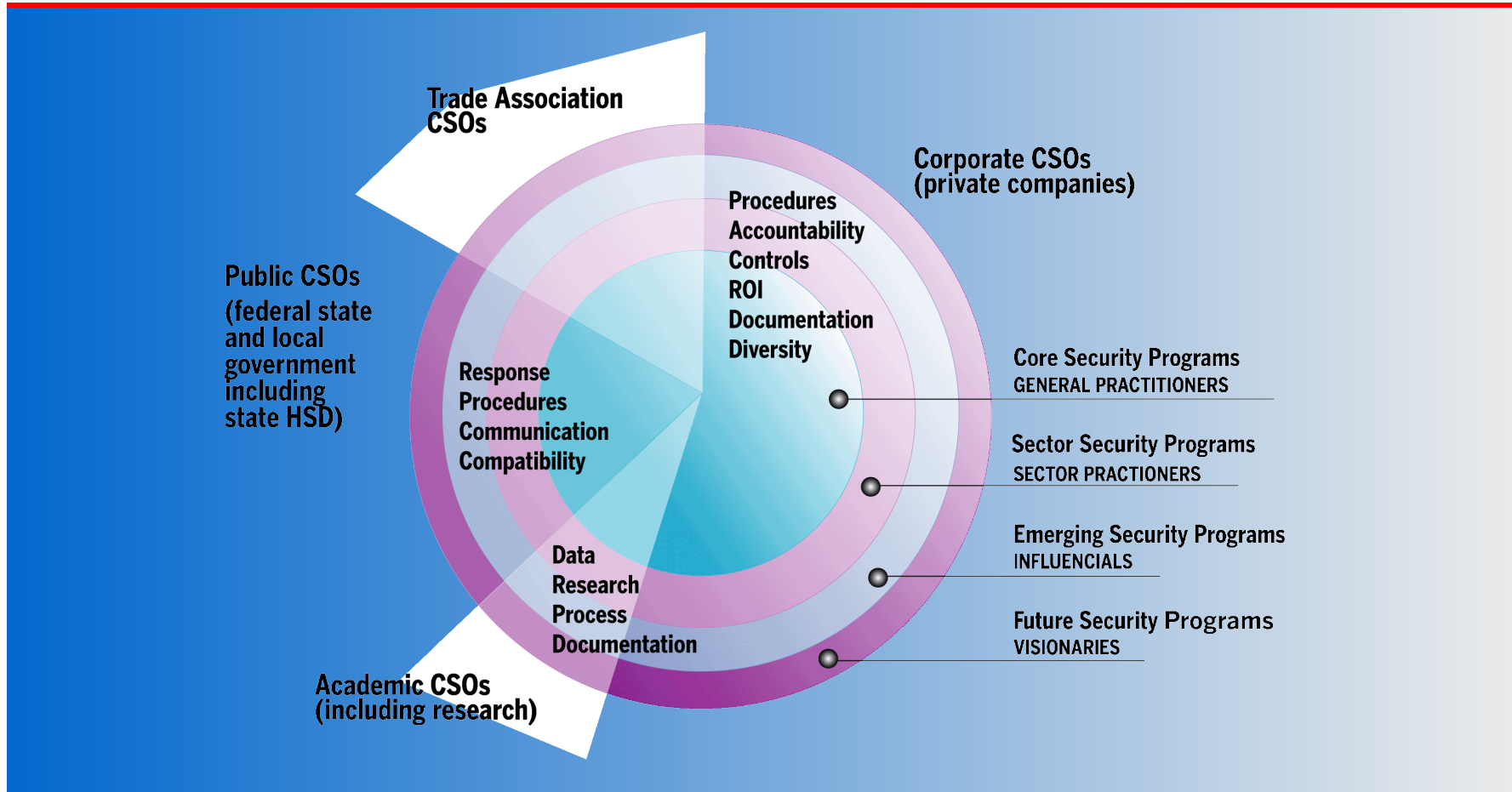


■ Leadership Management

Presenter Instructions:

This template tool has been created for you to use as part of the security organization's process for creating a strategic plan and for presentation of the plan to senior management. A number of these slides can also be used to show how the process will unfold (or is unfolding). One of the main goals is to demonstrate how the security organization is aligned to the business. This tool will be expanded to a full strategic plan documentation example (report). Many of us have attended business classes on Strategic Planning. The member requirement is provide a real world example of a previously successful strategic plan with options for modification and use by the members.

It is crucial to document where the security department is today, its history, and your plans for the future and how you will get there. This plan is centered on a risk based approach vs. standards and specifications or a regulatory requirement base approach.

Fill in your corporation's or security department's specific information. Included in the Notes section of most slides are "coaching" comments written by the CSO Emeritus Faculty Members on how best to use or present this information. Additional comments are made on potential options or problems you may consider. They are important to read to understand this product.

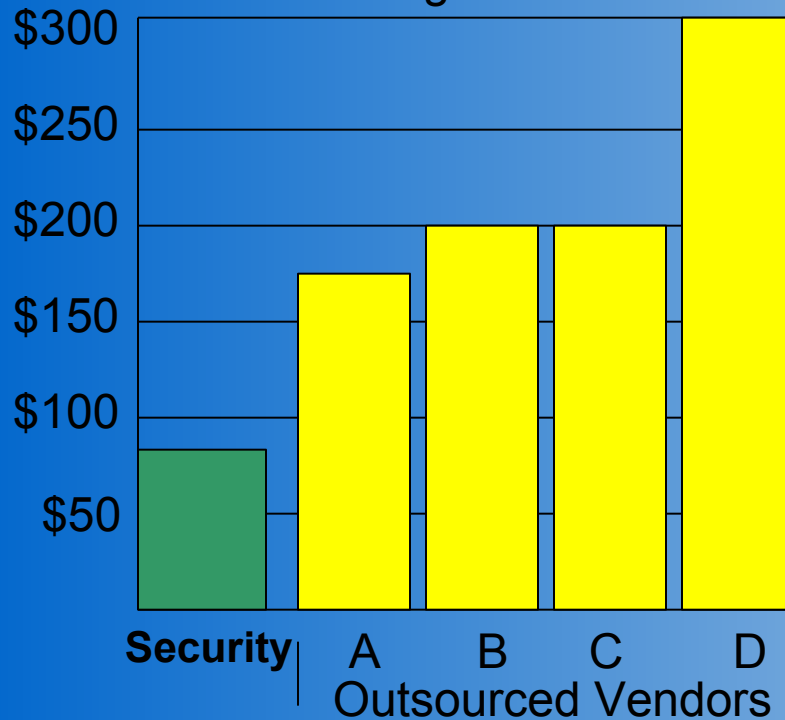

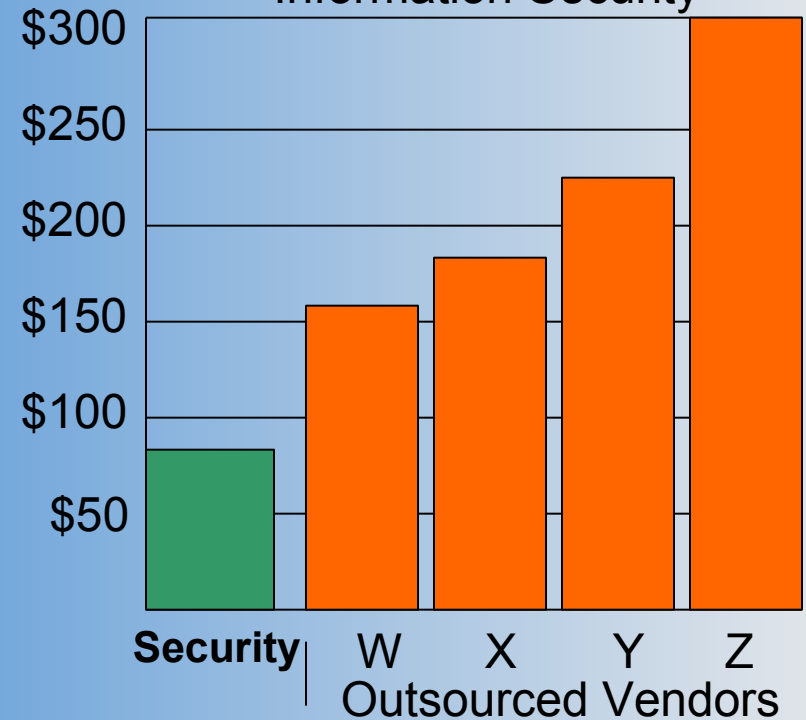
